The hidden horizons of Hope

There is a saying that, the hospitals are considered as divine sancturies where God appears to soothen the hearts of those who are sunken with grief. It is a also a sacred place because one learn to respect the pain of the sick and accompany them in this sacred ground, longing for the intervention of God, perceiving the subtle foot steps of God.



I had the possibility once again to be in this divine place and I consider it as a divine blessing. In the last one year of my life in Bambino Gesù hospital, Palidoro, Italy is rather a fruitful one with regard to its human and pastoral implications. On one side you meet the children along with their families undergoing great challenging situations and on the other side it's a place where one is offered healing and wellness in correspondence with the ailment. I had ample possibilities to be with the families who are in distress and who really need accompaniment, a shoulder to lean on especially when the sickness of

their little one persist and healing remain as remote reality.

The pastoral equipe of the hospital is constituted with a permanent Deacon along with 5 parish priests of surrounding territorial parishes and myself. Apart from the spiritual assistance that is being provided to long term and short term patients, through daily Eucharist, adoration, confessions, distribution of Holy communion, we also have special moments of communion and input sessions with the little patients where we help them to accept pain as part of life.

At the request of the hospital authorities I am asked to extend my visit to other centers of Bambino Gesù hospital; paliative care center in Passoscuro and Santa Marinella. The fact is that the patients are being shifted to each of these centers according to their pathological conditions and requirements of specific therapies.

To those children who are in the palliative care it is almost a survival period; between death and life and it is indeed a difficult task to accompany them to a serene end. In random situations we find parents of the children accept the reality and walk the path of profound faith.

In any of the case, the suffering of the innocent remains a mystery unexplainable in human terms. Only in the context of the Paschal mystery and in the transforming power of the Blood of Christ one can find real significance in suffering.

For I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us.

—Romans 8:18

Appropriately here I recall the very words of St.Paul "I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us" (Rom. 8, 18), enduring the pain, not for the sake of mere

living the suffering moments but finding in it a supernatural dimension of hope, assimilating it and uniting it to the sufferings of Jesus on the Cross, thus participating in His glory.

"When you pass through the deep waters I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned" (Is 43:2) The Lord makes His presence invisible in the suffering person and travels with him or her in all the highways of darkness. Our presence as Adorers in this reality of the Cross impels us to seek ways to live meaningfully

our daily crosses, so that those around us may comprehend the deeper meaning of the mystery of suffering and its implications in their life.

For the coming jubilee year, the pastoral equip of the hospital is on the process of discussion to bring about a series of reflections and other moments of prayer based on the chaplet of the Precious Blood. Sr.Nadia is also invited to develop the theme especially "on the innocent suffering and the Blood of Christ" which would indeed foster and enhance the richness of thought and its real application in the journey of life. From the moment of Jesus' birth to His death the bitter chalice was never missing in His life, or rather the love for human being made possible for Him to drink the chalice to the last drop...let us also profess along with the disciples "we are able to drink the Cup that you drink".


India a country of celebration, joy, brotherhood and festivals. A country that commemorate regional, religious and national festivals.

Thus the entire celebration made all the teachers enjoy and celebrate the journey as a teacher.



Formation through WORD of GOD!

"Man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." [Mt.4:3-4] This is the indication for each one of us that we need to be formed by the Word of God.



Ps 103:105 says: Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." Word of God enlightens us. Through the Word of God, we are comforted. We attain peace and we also experience healing.

Through the Word of God our conscience is formed. In order to form true and right conscience in our lives, in the light of the Word of God, the four types of conscience can be elaborated as under:

1. Killed and a dead conscience:

Hosea 4:6 says, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge." There are two types of knowledge; one is worldly knowledge i.e. we attain through education.

Second one is revealed knowledge i.e. Word of God or Knowledge about Jesus Christ.

We have to form our conscience through the power of the Word of God. In Mark 6:14-29, there are four characters namely: Herodias, Herodias daughter, Herod and John the Baptizer. Herodias developed a dead conscience. She nurtured sin in her heart. She lived an immoral life. She did not heed to the voice of God that came through John the Baptist. She killed her conscience. Instead of correcting herself, she wanted to kill John the Baptist. Hence, her conscience was dead. "And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him." [Mk 6:19]

2. Evasive Conscience:


Herodias' daughter had evasive conscience. She was not ready to take responsibility. When she danced in the party that pleased Herod and his guests, he said to her, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it". And he solemnly swore to her, "whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." [Mk 6:22-23] Then the Word of God says" she went out and said to her mother, "what should I ask for?".

Today we find faithful with evasive conscience. They are not rightly formed in their lives. If Priests and Religious develop evasive conscience, their lives also will be in trouble.



3. Wavering conscience:

Herod developed a wavering conscience. Herod lived an immoral life. He had married his own brother, Philip's wife, because he married her, John had been telling Herod. "It is



not lawful for you to have your brother's wife". Because of this, Herod arrested John and kept him in the prison.

Sometimes, we are like Herod with wavering conscience. We are not firm in faith. "If you do not stand firm in faith, you will not stand at all" [Is 7:9b]. Jesus said: "You cannot serve both God and wealth". [Mt. 6:24]

Conviction of the Word of God and teaching of the Church should go hand in hand. That's what made martyrs and saints to follow Jesus Christ without wavering in their faith.

4. Courageous Conscience:

John the Baptist had courageous conscience. He was willing to speak for what he believed to be true.

Are we willing to take a stand?

Are we willing to be the people after the heart of Jesus?

We have convictions as Christians because of the Grace of God.

Conclusion:

As we have reflected through the article, how we need to form ourselves, our conscience in the light of the Word and i.e. the voice of God. As it is said, Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts as in the rebellion" [Heb 3:15]. Psalmist also reminds us; do not harden your hearts, as at Meribah, as on the day at Massah in the wilderness" [Ps 95:8]. Let us come back to the Lord Jesus and lead a new life. Let us be cleansed by his word and be witnesses of his love to the humanity. Let his light shine upon us always.

HUMAN DIGNITY:

THE FOUNDATION OF OUR COMMUNITIES

The teachings of Pope Francis on human dignity provides a profound foundation for how we ought to treat one another in our religious communities. He reminds "Human dignity is the same for all human beings. When I trample on the dignity of another, I am trampling on my own." This statement challenges us to reflect deeply on our interactions within our communi-ties, asking whether our words and actions uplift or diminish the dignity of our brothers and sisters. Francis further emphasizes, "Things have a price and can be for sale, but people have a dignity that is priceless."

Do we value people based on their accomplishments, status, or usefulness to us, rather than seeing them as inherently worthy of respect simply because they are human beings? Pope John Paul II also spoke powerfully about this topic, stating, "Human persons are willed by God; they are imprinted with God's image. Their dignity not come from the work they do, but from the persons they are." Every person regardless of their role or achievements, deserves to be treated with the utmost

respect. As religious, we are called to embody this principle, recognizing the divine image in each person we encounter.

Challenges: Where is Human Dignity?

Despite positive experiences, deeply troubling stories from priests and sisters reveal that human dignity is not always upheld within their communities. One sister confided, "My community Superior loves our dog more than the community members. If there is a next life, I would like to be a dog in one of these convents." This shocking statement highlights the extent to which some members feel devalued and neglected.

Groupism is rampant, and Provincials are elected based on language groups. Such divisions, rooted in superficial criteria, undermine community unity and leave some members feeling marginalized. Language and caste also create divisions, as a Priest noted, "In our diocese, casteism divides us and creates groupism based on it."

Jealousy is another challenge eroding human dignity. One sister tearfully asked, "Is it a crime to be talented?" Her God-given gifts have made her a target of resentment, harming the sense of community.

expressed how her Superior violated her privacy by allowing visitors to use her room without informing her.

Practical steps: Building Communities of **Respect and Dignity:**

If we are to build sustainable and just communities, we must begin by recognizing and respecting each other's dignity. Here are some practical steps we can take to foster a culture of respect and dignity within our communities:

1. Foster Open Dialogue:

Encourage open and honest conversations within communities where every member feels heard and valued. For example, one community could implement a weekly "community circle" where members gather to share their thoughts and feelings in a safe and respectful environment. This can help address misunderstandings and prevent divisions based on language, caste, or personal biases. In another example, a congregation might hold periodic "listening sessions" where members are invited to voice their concerns

and ideas without fear of judgment or

2. Celebrate Achievements:

Just as we celebrate the achievements of our biological families, we should also celebrate the successes of sisters and brothers in our religious communities. For instance. community could create а "wall achievements" where members can post news of their accomplishments - whether academic, spiritual, or personal – for the community to see. This public recognition fosters a sense of pride and mutual respect.





3. Respect Privacy and Boundaries:

Every member of the community has the right to privacy and personal space. Respecting these boundaries is crucial for maintaining trust and dignity within the community. One way to ensure this is by establishing clear guidelines around the use of personal spaces, and offices, such as bedrooms and communicating these guidelines all members.

4. Avoid Defamation:

Defamation and gossip have no place in religious communities. Instead of speaking ill of others, we should strive to build each other up and protect each other's reputation. A practical step could be to introduce a "no gossip" pledge, where community members commit to refraining from negative talk about others and instead focus on positive and constructive communication.

5. Recognize the Divine in Each Person:

Pope John Paul II remind us that every person is imprinted with God's image. By recognizing the Divine in each other, we can create a community where everyone feels valued and respected. Regular communal prayers or reflections on human dignity, as well as

retreats focused on the teachings of Pope Francis and Pope John Paul II, can foster this recognition. Respecting individuality and involving every member in decision-making promotes harmony and attracts more vocations. When every member feels valued, the community becomes a place of growth, peace and joy – a true reflection of the Kingdom of God on earth.

Let us strive together for sustainable and just communities, congregations, dioceses, and world. By upholding the principles of human dignity in all our interactions, we can create environments around us where every person is treated with respect and love – where every member is indeed priceless.

The mark of community is not the absence of conflict. It's the presence of a reconciling spirit.


